

## SECOND CALL FOR ABSTRACTS - EXTENDED

### SCIENCE AND HISTORY OF SABLE ISLAND

October 20-21, 2017  
Halifax, Nova Scotia

On December 1, 2013 Sable Island National Park Reserve became officially protected under Canada's *National Parks Act* as its 43rd National Park. Parks Canada has assumed full administrative control of the island and has compiled an ecological and biodiversity assessment as part of the foundation for producing the legally-required park management plan.

In support of this process, the Friends of Sable Island Society will hold a conference on the Science and History of Sable Island including the marine environment that surrounds and maintains the island. This is planned as the second of a series of conferences related to the appreciation and management of this unique feature of the Canadian landscape. Natural history, cultural history, and park management will be the main conference themes, and these may include: marine and terrestrial biology, geology, sand transport dynamics, atmospheric physics, hydrology, oceanography, cultural history, biodiversity conservation, conservation of cultural relics, visitor management, and any other area of knowledge that will benefit sound management of the island and its surroundings as mandated by law. In celebration of Canada's 150th anniversary, the conference will also showcase Nova Scotia's integral role in Sable Island's growth, development or preservation. Areas of interest might include, but are not limited to, cultural history, government projects, wildlife, oil and gas activities, fresh water, tourism, meteorology, fishery, conservation, salvage, and military.

Being made entirely of sand, Sable Island is unusually dynamic and its existence depends on the continuous transport of sand from the surrounding bank onto the island's surface, where it is trapped by vegetation and then lost again in storms. This illustrates the unique challenge of managing Sable Island as a park because it is the only National Park surrounded by open sea, and the first one that would disappear as sea levels rise due to crustal changes combined with effects of climate change.

#### **To submit an abstract:**

Abstracts for talks of about 20 minutes, or for posters, should be up to 250 words in length and should address issues related to Sable Island, Sable Island Bank, and Sable Gully considered over a broad spectrum of public interest and concern. Presentations may cover research in progress, or work that has been completed recently.
